### **Executive Summary of Self Study Report**

Bishop Moore College, established in 1964, is owned and managed by the CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese and inherits the rich legacy of the CMS missionaries who are the pioneers of higher education in Kerala. Seasoned and tested by time and shaped by the passion and diligence of its stakeholders, the College has taken slow and steady but sure steps to achieve its present position of prominence in the NAAC and NIRF rankings, a considerable achievement considering its humble beginnings in a mofussil town.

Nestled in what was once a rocky and inhospitable terrain which was subsequently transformed into a verdant landscape by the eco-coconscious inheritors of the Bishop Moore legacy, the College, affiliated to the University of Kerala, has leapfrogged from a Junior College to one that harbors Undergraduate, Postgraduate and Research Departments. To crown it all, the College was reaccredited with an A grade by NAAC in 2017 and was ranked 76th among the Colleges of the country by NIRF in its 2020 rankings. The previous NIRF ranking was 92 in 2018 and was ranked between 101 and 150 in 2019.

Throughout its 57 years of existence, the College has followed its Motto in letter and spirit and has left no stone unturned in translating its <u>Vision</u> for excellence and <u>Mission</u> for global good into quantifiable realities.

The College offers 11 degree programmes, five PG programmes and also provides opportunities for students to carry out Summer Research Projects at reputed institutions across the country. It offers its research facilities to other institutions and offers opportunities to students for carrying out Summer Projects. It regularly produces University toppers in the UG and PG Examinations conducted by the University. The Undergraduate Science Programmes are supported by the STAR College Scheme of the Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India.

The College has vibrant Research Centres in the Departments of Physics and Chemistry and they are supported by the DST- FIST scheme of the Govt. of India and the KSCSTE-SARD scheme of the Govt. of Kerala. The College has 20 Research Guides who are well entrenched in the area of their expertise. There are 57 publications in international/UGC CARE listed journals during the last five years of which 9 are PG student projects. Five teachers have ongoing/completed Major Research Projects and 11 have completed Minor Research Projects. The teachers of the College hold Patents. The College has associated with agencies like UGC, KSCSTE, KSHEC, Indian Science Academies and GAD-TLC of MHRD in organising several National and International Conferences, FDPs as well as Refresher Courses and Lecture Workshops. The College has an MoU with Pushpagiri Research Centre to promote research in the bio-medical field. A collaborative research project on 'Human Breast Milk Powder' funded by Department of Bio-technology Government of India is under progress. The College is an ASAP institution of the Government of Kerala. Outreach programmes of the College include the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, Shastrajalakam and Gifted Children programme for school students (SIET) and participating Institute of MGNCRE-SCS REC.

1.1. The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

The College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) of the College monitors and ensures effective delivery of the curriculum.

**Planning:** The Principal convenes the CLMC which comprises of the Heads of the Departments. It is through these CLMC meetings, conducted every month, that the ways and means to implement the curriculum effectively is planned. In these meetings, the schedule of internal examinations and conduct of other curricular and extracurricular activities are finalised according to the University academic calendar. The action plan for the semester is charted out at the Department level, through the Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC), comprising of the Heads and Course Coordinators of the respective Departments based on the decisions of the CLMC. Course Coordinators are entrusted with the task of overseeing the proper implementation of the curriculum by setting a semester plan, where in the syllabus is distributed evenly within a semester. Each department prepares and submits the action plan. Teachers' diary is maintained by individual teachers which records their academic activities. Heads of the Departments verify the diary periodically which is counter-signed by the Principal.

**Implementation:** Most of the departments use black/glass/white boards as well as smart interactive boards for teaching learning process. Online curriculum delivery is effectively carried out through online platforms like Google meet and Google classroom. All the departments conduct courses in MOODLE -an Open source platform which is linked to the college website, for effective curriculum delivery.

The college, being affiliated to the University of Kerala follows the syllabi and academic calendars prepared by the University for the effective implementation of the curriculum.

- Problem solving Workshops and Hands on training for the students
- Interactive programmes with eminent scientists
- Knowledge enriching seminars and Invited Lectures by eminent professors.

**Documentation:** The Minutes of the Staff Council, CLMC and DLMC are properly maintained. Academic Calendar, Semester-Plans, Teachers Diary and Annual Reports of various Departments are systematically documented at the Department level. The college publishes handbook and calendar containing Mission and Vision statement, Code of conduct, General rules, contact details of all staff etc. The news and photographs of all the teaching learning processes are timely updated on the college website which is operated by the IQAC. The annual academic and administrative audit report is a centralised document of all the activities of the college. Newsletters are also brought out every year which documents all the activities of the college in an impressive manner.

### Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum

1.3.1.1 Describe methods by which Institution integrates cross- cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum Gender Equity, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics are woven into the CBCSS curriculum to shape the students into responsive and responsible citizens who would contribute towards global good.A plethora of courses, designed to address the environmental issues and aimed at sensitizing the students towards such issues are a part of the curriculum. The courses are:

Environmental Studies and Disaster Management (EN1211.1), Paristhithi: Sidhanthavum Avishkaravum (ML1331), Environmental Studies and Phytogeography (BO1542), Environmental Studies (BB1241), Environmental Biotechnology(BB1672), Basics of Environmental Biotechnology (BB1553). These courses are designed to impart a basic understanding of the structure and function of the environment and its interaction with the living systems. It will impart knowledge about the geographical distribution of plants, the impact of human intervention in the environment and the delicate balance of various factors in the environment. It gives an idea about the various types of biodiversity and the influence of environmental pollution on biodiversity.

**Selection of Elective Courses:** The choice of elective courses in both undergraduate and post graduate programmes is an opportunity where affiliating courses can explore the possibility of integrating cross-cutting issues into the programme on their own choice

Gender issues are addressed in the curriculum of Languages and Literature programme through elective courses like Women's Writing (EN1644), Dalithezhuthu, Pennezhuthu- Sidhanthavum Avishkaravum (ML1431) etc. The students are made aware of the pressing gender issues and are made to think of ways and means to set things right. Human values are discussed as a part of the various courses in Humanities programmes. In the Animal Biotechnology (BB1573) course offered under Biotechnology programme the students are sensitized on the ethical issues of Animal biotechnology.

# Zero Credit Courses:

The College also gives special emphasis on Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human values during the choice of zero credit course of 30 hours that has to be successfully completed as part of the fourth semester of the Undergraduate Programmes. The courses selected for the academic year 2019-20 keeping this mind are Environmental Activities Club, Performing Arts-Folklore Club, Nature/Eco Club, Planning Forum and Human Rights Club

### **Open Courses:**

Affiliating colleges are given the flexibility to choose open courses for each programme from among the list provided by the University for each programme. During the selection of the course, the Departments consider various aspects, among which impartation of values are given special attention. Some examples are Energy Physics offered by the Department of Physics, Human Resources Management offered by the Department of Economics and Public Health and Hygiene offered by the Department of Zoology.

**Assignments, Seminars and Projects:** Assignments, Projects and Seminars, realated to Professional Ethics, Gender issues, Environment and Sustainability and Human Values are provided wherever possible, so as to inculcate in them a positive attitude. The zero credit courses give

special emphasis on projects related to energy conservation,Water Quality Survey etc. Students are promoted and motivated to undertake their research projects on environment and sustainability like water quality analysis, Survey on Women Issues, synthesis of bioplastics etc

### 2.3 Teaching - Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

2.3.1.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The College designs the process of planning, delivery of curriculum and assessment in such a way that it is student centric. The various departments follow different strategies to make learning more student-centric and ensure the holistic development of students.

### 1. Experiential Learning

- 1. **Project Work-** For UG and PG projects, students choose topics in their area of interest and teachers give sufficient guidelines and support for the completion of their work.
- Summer Research Projects Science students are encouraged to apply for Summer Research projects at institutions of national repute. 18 students have successfully completed Summer Research Projects at institutes like IISc, JNCASR, IITs, IGCAR, IISER, IIST etc. during 2015-20, which provide them experiential learning towards research.
- 3. **Field Trips** Field Trips, regularly organized by the College to reputed institutions and places of importance, have proved to be vital in bridging the gap between the traditional classroom and hands-on experience.
- 4. **Industrial Visits** Various departments organize industrial visits, which provide insight to students regarding internal working of reputed companies and practical perspectives of work places.
- 5. **Invited Talks** The College regularly provides opportunities to students to listen to globally-respected researchers, local luminary, celebrities and well-known academicians.
- 6. **National and International Conferences-** The departments conduct national and international conferences regularly, and students are given responsibilities which equip them to organize events systematically and effectively and they get

opportunities to interact with scholars from different cultural and social backgrounds and listen to scholarly lectures.

### 2. Participative Learning

- 1. Role Plays, Debates, Public Speaking and Seminars are among the participative learning methodologies adopted by the College.
- 2. **Group and Team Work-** Celebration of important days, NSS and NCC camps, Village Adoption (UBA), Tree plantation, Swatch Bharat, Health awareness Camps, blood donation camps etc. help the students to learn the art of living in a team for the welfare of the society and community as a whole.
- 3. Extension activities- NSS, NCC, Science Club, Sports Club, Bhoomithrasena, Entrepreneurship Development Club, Women's Study Unit, Debate Club, Literary Club, Nature Club etc. are certain extension programmes offered by the College and this will help to sensitize the students regarding social values, responsibilities and knowledge of prominent societal issues and problems.
- 4. **College Magazine-** The College magazine *Vidyasarith* is published annually. Students contribute articles and work on the editorial board which help improve their creative and administrative skills.
- 5. **Exhibitions** Students get a chance to apply the practical aspects of their learning through exhibitions organized by the departments.

### 3. Problem solving Methodology

- Case Studies- Case studies are used as a teaching tool to show the application of theories and concepts to real situations. For instance, in Environmental Science paper, project work is assigned to identify environmental issues in their neighbourhood and submit a report of the same.
- 2. **Assignments-** Assignment topics involve problem-solving, in which students are required to identify the problem and resolve it in a scientific way.
- 3. **Quiz Competitions-** All the departments conduct inter-department quiz competitions based on various topics.

2.3.4 Innovation and Creativity in teaching-learning

2.3.4.1 Upload description of innovation and creativity in teaching-learning process not more than 500 words

Innovation and creativity in teaching-learning process is manifested in the following strategies that the College adopts:

- Use of National instruments Multisim software and LT Spice software for the design of electronic projects and practicals
- Use of virtual lab for the Conceptualization of experiments in Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology
- Bringing 'Bank to campus' for the familiarization of banking procedure for commerce students
- Use of Mendeley software by Chemistry students, to arrange the research articles and format their bibliographies according to standard journal formats
- Organizing of nine lecture workshops in association with the Indian Science Academies (INSA, New Delhi, NASI, Allahabad and IASc, Bengaluru) on topics included in the PG syllabus, where fellows of the Indian Academies lead the lectures, giving exposure to the latest research happening in related fields
- Providing e-resources like E- journals and E- books, including INFLIBNET facility for PG and research students
- Providing e-access to previous years University question papers through the College website
- Recommending students to institutes of national repute to carry out Summer research projects. 18 students from the Science departments have successfully completed Summer research projects in IISc, JNCASR, IITs, IGCAR, IISER and IIST.
- Collaboration with various reputed institutions and agencies to aid the students in getting first hand information as well as hands-on training on the emerging technologies
- Incorporation of Learning Management System (Moodle) and digital technologies like Google Meet, Google Classroom, Zoom etc. in teaching
- Conduct of online internal examinations
- Giving opportunities to Language students to watch world renowned movies as part of the Film Studies paper
- PG students are encouraged to prepare multimedia presentations as part of the classroom seminars.
- Providing opportunity to meet and interview celebrities as part of the UG project work.
- Offering add-on courses to students

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System at the Institutional level

2.5.1.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) System at the Institutional level

- The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system is monitored by the College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC). CLMC constitutes the Principal as the Chairperson, Heads of departments, elected representatives of teachers in the College Council and a student representative. A member selected by the CLMC from among the Heads of the Departments shall be the Convenor.
- Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) consisting of the Head of the Department and all teachers of the Department shall monitor the conduct of Courses and evaluation under CIE. The Head of the Department shall be the Chairperson and a teacher selected by DLMC from among the members shall be the Convenor.
- The College has a full-fledged Internal Examination Cell under the governance of CLMC for the smooth conduct of Centralized Internal Examination. The CLMC selects two faculties as the Coordinators of the Internal Examination cell. They are responsible for the preparation of time table and invigilation duty list, collection of question papers from concerned course advisors, sorting of question papers, smooth conduct of examination and the distribution of answer scripts to concerned faculties. The Internal Examination Cell, DLMC, and CLMC jointly announce the dates for the distribution of corrected answer scripts to the students. Thus, they make sure that the best possible outcomes are assured. The College also offers facilities to solve their grievances regarding internal examination scores.
- Attending the internal examination is mandatory. Retest is conducted for students who have not attended the same due to genuine reasons.
- Internal Examination for post graduate students are conducted at the department level.
- The institution strictly follows the criteria given by the University for Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE).

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

2.5.2.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

- The assessment criteria are published in the College Handbook and also explained by the teachers in the classes.
- The dates of internal exams are published on the notice board and also informed by the class wardens and HoDs.
- Students have the freedom to submit an assignment or make a seminar presentation.
- Internal marks are awarded for the report submitted by students based on their field visits.
- Students are given the opportunity to verify their final attendance in each semester.
- After the internal examination, course advisors evaluate the answer scripts and distribute them to students within one week. The students can scrutinize their answer scripts in the presence of their teachers. It ensures the transparency and reliability of the internal evaluation process.
- The course advisors of each course prepare the continuous evaluation mark list as per the

University guidelines. After getting the confirmation and signature of all students, the course advisor hand over the mark list to the concerned faculty advisor, who consolidates the CE marks of all subjects of a student and gets them signed by the students.

- The consolidated CE marks are uploaded in the low level (faculty advisor level) of the University portal and forwarded to the middle level (HoD level). The HoD verifies these marks and forwards them to the high-level (Principal level) where the Principal verifies the marks and forwards them to the University. The final print out of the marks are also signed by the students.
- Frequency: The college conducts one test paper per semester in a centralised manner as a model examination in the university examination pattern. Course advisors conduct class tests before the model examination.
- CCTV cameras monitor the examination process so that the cases of malpractices are very rare.
- Model examination for practical and viva voce are conducted at the department level.
- Absentees with genuine reasons get an opportunity for re-test.

2.5.3.1 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, tim e-bound and efficient

- There are three levels of grievances redressal available to the students with regard to internal assessment at the Faculty advisor level, at the HoD level (DLMC) and finally at the Principal level (CLMC). Students can approach these levels in a hierarchical order to register their grievances regarding discrepancy in evaluation. Because of the transparency in the distribution of answer scripts and internal assessment procedures, grievances related to the continuous internal evaluation are rare.
- There is a Grievances Redressal Cell in the College which can be approached by the students/faculty for the redressal of grievances. The grievances lodged before the Grievances Redressal Cell will be solved immediately or necessary steps will be taken in a time-bound manner.
- At the University level, all answer scripts of the undergraduate End Semester Examinations are valued by an Additional Examiner and a Chief Examiner at Central Evaluation camps. Students can apply for revaluation or scrutiny of answer scripts if they are not satisfied with the original evaluation. The answer scripts of post graduate examinations are sent for first valuation and second valuation to two separate centres. Answer scripts with a difference of more than eight marks are sent for third valuation.

- **Botany Museum** has preserved specimens(formalin/alcohol) of botanical importance, marine and fresh water algae, microscopic and macroscopic fungi, rare collections of

bryophytes, pteridophytes, gymnosperms, morphological and anatomical specimens of angiosperms.

Green House consists of rare and endangered plants. Afull time gardener takes care of the plants.

The **Central Library** is home to around 52000 books and is fully automated with KOHA software version 18.11 updated in 2017. The students are given Inflibnet access.Postgraduate Departments have libraries of their own.

Internet connectivity with a bandwidth of 100 Mbps is available in the Institution.

Learning Management System MOODLE is effectively used in teaching and learning (http://bishopmoorecollege.org/moodle/)

The College has initiated the construction of a State of the Art Library Complex. Purchase of 4 Interactive Boards and Installation of a Video Conferencing Centre will be realized in the current academic year utilizing the RUSA grant.

### **Facilities for Sports and Games**

The College provides ample scope for students to engage in outdoor and indoor sports and games. The college has a 200m track stadium, Basket Ball Court, Volley Ball Court, Badminton Court and facilities for Judo, Wrestling, Soft ball and Athletics. The stadium is also the venue for public sports, games and tournaments as well as Inter-Collegiate Competitions. The faculty of the Department of Physical Education.consisting of an Associate Professor and an Assistant Professor, provides adequate coaching to the students. The College hosts Inter-Collegiate Competitions frequently. Residential facility is made available for sports students. Fitness Centre, Weight training Equipment, Judo mats (32 No.s), are made available for students and staff. The College has a Sports Council of Kerala recognized sports hostel. The College has produced International players in soft ball and is among the few institutions promoting the sport of soft ball.

Sports students are provided with food and accommodation. Student Aid fund is utilized to help participants meet the travel/occasional expenses. Annual Sports Meet is conducted during the month of February/March.

#### **Facilities for cultural activities**

The College helps nurture and develop the creative talents of the students. Cultural activities include College Arts Festival titled "Kalasarith", which helps the students showcase their talents. House wise competitions are held and trophies are awarded to the members of the top scoring house. The facilities for presenting cultural activities include an Auditorium, which has a seating capacity of 1000, audio visual facilities, properly maintained acoustics, balcony seatingand stage equipped

with light and sound arrangements. There are also two Open Air Stages to hold street plays, flash mobs and gatherings for social awareness. Literary Club and Folklore Club makeuse of the Technology Enabled Learning Spaces. Financial Support is provided to students to participate inthe University Level Cultural Competitions. College Magazine, "Vidyasarith" is prepared and released by the College Union every year. The magazine is made up of the literary and artistic creations of the students of the college.

The Library had automated its housekeeping activities using LibSoft software upto 2017 and later switched over to the universal and user-friendly open source automation software KOHA version 18.11 in 2017. Open Access Catalogue for students and staff is made available through KOHA Library Management Software to know the bibliographical details about the collection. The various housekeeping activities of the library such as data entry, issue and return and renewal of books, member logins etc are done through the software. Shelf index is properly maintained. Five

computers with internet connectivity and 2 printers are made available. Separate reading room is provided and Reprographic facility is arranged inside the library. Exclusive reference section is available in the library. Apart from the printed books the library is having access to e resources of N LIST which is a part of *eshodhsindhu* consortium of INFLIBNET, where the users are given awareness and made to access browse and download e books, e journals, databases etc. Question papers of all University examinations compiled and made available for reference. Book Binding Section is utilized to serve the purpose as well as to mend damaged books on a timely basis.

Special facilities are offered by the library to the visually/physically challenged persons. Seats are reserved for physically challenged students in the library. Special assistance is given for Online Public Access Catalogue and internet browsing. The library staff helps in the search, issue and return of books. Books required for visually/physically challenged students are issued to assistants.

The college library building with a total seating capacity of 80 is open from 8.30 am to 4.30 pm during working days and from 10.00 am to 4 pm during vacation and Saturdays. The library collection includes more than 52000 books, 24 journals, 23 magazines and newspapers. Facilities offered by the library include issue/return/ renewal of books, reprographic services, press clippings, reference services, UGC Inflibnet Online services and wifi facility.

**The college has a main Computer Centre with** 18 Desktop Computers and I server, UPS facility, LAN, Internet Connectivity, Printer and Scanner and two computer centres attached to the departments. One is the Physics Computer and Networking Centre which is air conditioned with 25 Desktop computers and 1 server facilitated by LAN and two units of 5 KVA battery installed. The third Computer lab, shared by the Departments of Commerce and Mathematics, has 16 Desktop computers, LAN, 5 KVA battery and an LCD projector. A computer professional is in charge of the main Computer Centre.

The teaching departments, library and Administrative Block have computers with internet/wi-fi facility. The main Computer centre with internet connectivity is made available for students and

faculty during college hours. The college library has five computers with internet connectivity. The ladies hostel of the college which is located outside the campus has two computers with internet connectivity available for resident students and staff.

The institution provides Laptop/notebook, LCD projector, and white board facilities for ICT enabled teaching. All Departments have projector enabled rooms.

Two rooms are equipped with Interactive Board with 75" and 65" active display respectively and a resolution of 3840\*2160, windows - 4K, Android - 4k (new technology) with internet connectivity.

The Physics Research lab has two work station computers (Intel Xeon PU E3-1220V2S, 8 GB RAM) purchased under the DST FIST Scheme to facilitate high computational cost calculations. The Administrative Block, the Physics Research Centre, the Physics Computer Centre and Commerce Computer Lab are LAN enabled and supported by stand alone facility. Specialised software KOHA, Spectroscopic software IR solution, Math Lab, UV Probe, Gaussian 09, Gauss View, Chemcraft, ChemDraw etc are installed in various nodes. The software is updated as and when it is necessary. The upkeep and maintenance of the computers are taken care of under the annual Maintenance Contract. The Broadband bandwidth was upgraded from 40Mbps to 100 Mbps in September 2020.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities -laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. 4.4.2.1 Describe policy details of systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities on the website within a maximum of 1000 words The Management, Governing Council, IQAC, Staff Council, Departments and various committees work together to cater to the needs of teaching and learning community. They are entrusted with the responsibility of ensuring that the college expands its physical infrastructure as per the demands of its academic growth. The college has a formal Infrastructure Committee with sub committees for Hostel, Canteen, Library, and Book Stall, which work out the additional requirements of various academic units, and ensures that adequate physical infrastructure is in place for all courses being run as well as for the new courses being introduced. The infrastructural requirements as well as upgrading of the existing facilities of each Department are discussed and listed in Department meetings. Judicious allocation of funds for various purposes is done by making use of funds from the UGC accounts, PD accounts and Management funds. These committees also serve in ensuring the optimal utilization of the available infrastructure by students as well as other stake holders. Interdisciplinary Research Committee ensures that the institution utilises maximum funds from various agencies like the UGC, DST, FIST, RUSA and KSCSTE. Proper utilization of sanctioned funds and maintenance of records are monitored by the committee. Optimal utilization as well as timely maintenance of major equipments by the respective companies/suppliers is also ensured. Extra expenses if any are met by the Management. HoDs and Senior Superintendent are authorized to ensure upkeep of equipments. Budget for development of infrastructure is allotted from Management funds as well as from various agencies like UGC, DST, KSCSTE etc. Feedback obtained from students is analysed by IQAC and is taken into account while proposals for infra structure development are submitted before the Governing Council.

**Project Execution Committees:** DBT STAR Committee, KSCSTE SARD Committee and RUSA Committee

The government funds utilized during 2018-19 were the DBT STAR College fund for the development of Teaching Learning facilities for Undergraduate level teaching, DST FIST scheme for development of Research Departments and the KSCSTE SARD scheme for the setting up of the Centre for Advanced Functional Materials of the Department of Physics. Proper and timely utilization of the funds under these schemes are ensured by the respective project execution committees. RUSA scheme of Government of India was sanctioned during the academic year 2018-19 with the objective of enhancing the academic ambience of the institution. A funding of Rs. 2 crores was sanctioned under the scheme.

Library Advisory Committee : It consists of the Librarian, senior faculty members, student representatives and library staff as its members. The committee advices on purchase and acquisition of titles, journals, periodicals and ensures utilization of funds available under various schemes like UGC, P.D. account, Library fee, etc. It supervises the allocation and utilization of funds for various departments. Accordingly, the Principal/UGC Committee allots a specific amount from the Library Fee and UGC fund respectively to each Department in order to purchase books. The list of titles prepared by each Department is verified and sanctioned by the Library Committee.

The College has a democratic and participatory Management system which includes the Management Board, IQAC, the Staff Council, CLMC and DLMC.

The Bishop of CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese is the Manager of the college. **The Management Board** consisting of eleven members, including the Manager, Principal and Vice Principal is the apex body. The Management Board discusses and plans all the activities to be implemented in the institution. It prepares the budget to meet the financial requirements and draws upon plans to improve the quality of infrastructure and research facilities of the college. It designs policies for the successful functioning of the institution complying with the guidelines issued by the UGC, University and the Government of Kerala from time to time for the successful conduct of academic programmes. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell serves as think-tank and devises strategies and plans for the development of the institution. The strategies devised by the IQAC are submitted to the Management Board and the Staff Council for approval.

The proposals put forward by the Management Board are ratified by the Staff Council, consisting of the Principal, the Heads of the Departments and two elected members of the faculty. The Staff Council assesses the feasilbility of the plans and projects and gives its approval. The implementation of the policies is ensured through the Bursar, who is the management representative in the college. The Staff Council recommends suggestions and ensures the implementation of the plans. The **CLMC** which consists of the Principal and the Heads of the Departments endorses the decisions of the Staff Council, which are then communicated to the faculty members by the Heads of the Department at Department level meetings (DLMC) and suggestions put forward by the members are communicated to the Staff Council by the Heads of the Departments. Regular Staff Meetings offer a democratic platform where every member of the college gets a chance to share his/her opinion and consensus is reached through deliberations and discussions. The college level activities are carried on by various committees constituted for the purpose with the teaching and non-teaching staff as the members.

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

6.1.2.1 Describe a case study showing decentralization and participative management in the institution in practice within a maximum of 500 words

Each Department in the college has an association which is headed by a student convener of the concerned department. This association is in charge of all the activities of the Department during the academic year. The association has as its members all the students and faculty of the Department. The activities of the entire year are charted by this association and the decisions taken by the students are endorsed at the department and college level. Association activities include conduct of seminars, competitions and discussion forums as part of student responses to socially relevant issues. The association provides a platform to the students to interact with scholars from various fields, to develop leadership qualities, to improve their interpersonal skills and to broaden their perspectives. The Departments and the college provide the resources for all the initiatives of the associations.

For example, the English Association as part of the various events for the year conducts Laurel Literaria, a vibrant and creative event conducted annually from 2000 onwards. The two day event is organized by the students of the Department with a programme committee comprising of the students and faculty members. The students play a significant role in the conduct of the programme which marks the culmination of the Department activities of the year. As part of Laurel Literaria an

inter-collegiate quiz is conducted with faculty members from the college or neighbouring colleges as Quiz Master. The various activities enable the students to develop and hone their skills.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Perspective/Strategic plan and Deployment documents are available in the institution

6.2.1.1 Describe one activity successfully implemented based on the strategic plan within a maximum of 500 words

The financial aid from the UGC helped to strengthen the basic teaching and laboratory facilities in all Departments during the past years. However, it was insufficient in terms of the increased student strength in various subjects. So there was a greater demand for funds to support the teaching learning programme, to promote greater interest in students and to infuse scientific temper. In view of this, the IQAC placed a suggestion before the Staff Council to submit a proposal for the DBT STAR College Scheme of the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India. The Staff Council entrusted upon the Heads of the Science Departments to submit the requirements of their Departments and unanimously elected Dr. Dinesh Raj R. as the co-ordinator of the scheme. The joint proposal was submitted and sanction was accorded for the same in 2017 for Rs. 33 lakhs to strengthen undergraduate teaching learning in the science Departments.

The proposed programme is envisaged to create a scientific temper among all the stakeholders including teachers, non-teaching staff and more particularly, the students.

### The specific objectives are

- to enhance bench skills of students by undertaking project work and participating summer training & industrial training programmes.
- to upgrade the competency of faculty by participating in various faculty improvement programmes/workshops/ seminars etc.
- to empower the non teaching staffs to keep in pace with the rapid changes of their respective fields.
- to equip the teachers, non teaching staffs and students to meet the challenges of a technosavvy era by familiarizing IT enabled resources and methods.
- to enhance student interaction with eminent scientists
- to enhance the student's written and oral communication skills, including presentations and research report writing.
- to introduce students to possible career opportunities.

Qualitative improvements due to DBT support.

1. **Improved Degree Results**: Nine University ranks (first 3) were achieved during the assessment period. The pass percentage for UG improved from 44.6% in the pre DBT STAR period to 64.09% in 2019. The pass percentage of PG also improved from 64.8 in the pre DBT period to 77.6 in the assessment period.

2. Placement for Higher Education: Because of the increased pass percentage, better training

and more exposure of students by interacting with eminent scholars, more students are opting postgraduation for higher studies. More number of students (9 students) are admitted to state university centers, central universities, NITs, IITs etc. for Post-graduation than the pre DBT period.

3. **Quality of B.Sc. Project improved**. The Department of carried out two projects on the preparation of bioplastics. Two moisture analysers purchased by DBT grant is utilized to measure the moisture content of the prepared biofilm.

### 4. Conference presentations

Because of the improved exposure both UG and PG Students are presenting their dissertations in conferences. 25 PG and UG students have presented their dissertations at conferences. The increased interactions with eminent scientists and researchers encouraged our students to attend workshops or training programmes offered by reputed institutions. Twenty students have availed summer research fellowship in the above category.

The authority for decision-making regarding academics and administration is the Manager. The Bishop of CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese is the Manager of the college. The Management Board consisting of eleven members, including the Manager, Bursar, Principal and Vice Principal formulates the policies and strategies to be implemented for the governance of the institution. The Bursar helps the Principal in coordinating the College activities. The action plan is reviewed by the Staff Council with the active involvement of the IQAC. The proposals put forward by the Management Board are ratified by the Staff Council, consisting of the Principal, the Heads of the Departments and two elected members of the faculty. The Staff Council recommends suggestions and ensures the implementation of
the plans. The CLMC which consists of the Principal and the Heads of the Departments endorses the decisions of the Staff Council, which are then communicated to the faculty members by the Heads of the Department at Department level meetings (DLMC) and suggestions put forward by the members are communicated to the Staff Council by the Heads of the Departments. Regular Staff Meetings offer a platform where every member of the college gets a chance to share his/her opinion and consensus is reached through deliberations and discussions.

The other bodies apart from IQAC, Staff Council and CLMC that are specially dedicated for the functions assigned to them include

Committees, Examinations Cell, the Grievances Redressal Cell, Research, Extension Activities and Administration. Principal of the College is the Chief Superindentant of University Examinations. An Assistant Chief Superindentant delivers the duties related to the conduct of Examinations in the College.

Various committees have been delegated for special functions which are Discipline Committee, Library Committee, Infrastructure ICT and Computer Centre Committee,Hostel Committee, Sports Committee,Bookstall and Canteen Committee, UGC Affairs Committee, Publicity Documentation and Website Committee, Admission Committee, Career Guidance and Placement Cell, Women Empowerment Committee, AntiRaging Cell, Counselling Cell, Students Affairs, DBT STAR Committee, ASAP Committee, STARS Committee, StEP Committee, Scholarship Committee, Arts Club, Student Aid Fund Committee, **Continuuing Education** Committee, Equal Opportunity Centre, Mentoring System, HR and Event Management, RUSA Committee, AICHE Commitee, WWS and SSP **Committee and Internal** Examinations Cell. The Principal, Vice Principal and IQAC Coordinator are the Ex-Officio members of all the committees.

Four cells function under the Grievances Redressal Mechanism- the Students Grievances Redressal Cell, the Committee against Sexual Harassment, the Committee against Caste Discrimination and the Staff Grievances Redressal Cell.The Vice Principal monitors the activities of the cells.

A Staff member serves as the General Co-ordinator of the Extension Activities of the College.The ED Club, Bhoomithrasena, Literary Club, NSS, NCC, Women's Study Unit, Environmental Activities Club, Folklore Club, Debate Forum, Science Club, Debate Forum, Science Club, Sports Club, Nature Club, Planning Forum, Debate Club, Theatre Club, Health Club, Media Club and Human Rights Club are active in the college with separate convener for each club.

The Inter-Disciplinary Research activities are co-ordinated by a Senior Faculty (Research Guide). The Administrative

6.2.4 Effectiveness of various bodies/cells/committees is evident through minutes of meetings and implementation of their resolutions

6.2.4.1 Describe one activity successfully implemented based on the Minutes of the meetings of various Bodies/ Cells and Committees within a maximum of 500 words

In the meeting of the IQAC held on 22 October 2015, it was decided to start a new initiative named STARS (Students and Alumni for a Responsible Society) aimed at zeroing in on the students who have the potential to make a positive change to the society, work on their emotional and intellectual faculties and thus facilitate their transformation into contributing citizens.

Objectives of the Initiative:

- To mould students into responsible citizens
- To promote active involvement of alumni in developing a culture to cater to the needs of the local society
- To encourage interaction between students and alumni
- To enhance the employability skills of the students

A core group of 40 students are selected as volunteer leaders of STARS, every year. They are groomed under reputed alumni and teachers. The immediate need of the society is identified from time to time and necessary interventions are made. For instance, during the floods which ravaged the state in August 2018, the STARS volunteers intervened in the situation of shortage of basic needs in relief camps, by distributing food, clothing and other essentials. A delegation visited the flood affected students to evaluate the extent of loss that occurred and identified 20 students who were severely affected by the flood. Cash compensations of Rs. 5000, Rs. 25,000, Rs. 50,000 were given according to the extent of damage. A flood proof house was constructed for a severely affected student residing in a flood prone area, made possible by contributions received from the alumni, parents and teachers.

As part of STARS, 10 best outgoing students are selected every year through a four level selection

process and three among them are adjudged as the "Stars of Moore". The first level of selection is a preliminary written test for all outgoing students. The second level is a verification of the academic and co-curricular achievements of the students selected in the first level. Those selected at the second level are given training for interviews and group discussions. The third level is a personal interview conducted by a reputed panel which includes an academician, a psychologist and an eminent person from the corporate sector through which 10 best performing students are selected. The final round is an open stage performance. The three STARS of MOORE are selected after taking into consideration the cumulative score of the final three rounds. The awards to the best students are distributed by renowned persons in 'PATHEYAM', a programme dedicated to bid adieu to the outgoing students.

The STARS initiative has been one of the success stories of the College. It has helped in consolidating a culture that is in sync with the humanitarian values that the College espouses. STARS has helped the students achieve a happy union of the best of the heart and the mind. Besides this, more material and immediately visible contributions to the society such as the contributions made by STARS at the time of natural catastrophes too is significant.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

Teaching is a strenuous job and managing the administrative side too takes its toll on the non teaching staff. An employee with a healthy body and a healthy mind is a prerequisite for a burgeoning work place. Recognizing this, the College has initiated StEP (Staff Enrichment Programme), an initiative designed to ameliorate the physical, emotional, mental and monetary well being of the employees and thereby harness their potential to the maximum.

Welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching

The College has a Staff Recreation Room, rich with indoor games like Carroms, Chess, Table Tennis and a small library. This is the place where the teachers and the non teaching staff unwind after a long day at work. Besides this, there is an indoor badminton court which is abuzz with activity after working hours. The College Staff is also encouraged to make use of the basket ball court in the College Hostel and also the College Cricket/Football ground.

Every year the College arranges for a Staff Recreation Tour to a place of verdant beauty. This has proved to a very successful detoxifying measure and an immensely successful team building activity.

The IQAC organizes one week induction training programmes for newly recruited Teaching and Non Teaching Staff since 2018. The training programmes have structured syllabi and schedules aimed at the outcome of grooming the new staff into the niceties of the job at hand. Three batches have undergone the training since 2018.

An yearly retreat is organised for the Teaching and Non Teaching Staff of the College for spiritual nurturing.

The College also has a functioning Cooperative Society that chips in with help when the chips are down in form of monetary exigency for the employees.

Hostel facility is made available for members of staff/ faculty whose residence is far from college.

Professional Development programmes for both teaching and non teaching staff are organised.

Faculty are motivated to attend faculty development programmes and the college and management provides support for the same. Under various schemes the teachers are provided financial support for attending professional development programmes.

College also organises felicitation programmes for the staff receiving awards and recognitions.

6.3.5.1 Describe the functioning status of the Performance Appraisal System for teaching and nonteaching staff within amaximum of 500 words

Performance Appraissal by teaching staff is conducted annually. Members of faculty maintain a record of the Curricular, Co-curricular and Research activites undertaken by them which is approved by the respective Heads of the Departments.

Performance Appraisal is also conducted as and when a faculty/staff is due for promotion. The appraisal is conducted based on the UGC and Government norms.

- The faculty members who are due for promotion have to submit the completed PBAS form to IQAC. The completed application is scrutinized by the IQAC and appraised by a screening committee constituted by the University which includes external Subject Experts also. IQAC makes it a point to encourage all faculty members of the college to engage in academic activities which will benefit them for promotion.
- The IQAC provides training to members of non-teaching staff during their probation period. The training offered during this period is to familiarize them with basic office management, to improve their communication skills and to develop their interpersonal skills. They are encouraged to write Department Level tests for their promotion.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

6.5.1.1 Describe two practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives within a maximum of 500 words

The IQAC designs the quality parameters and ensures that the standards of excellence reflected in the vision and mission of the College are met and continued. The IQAC prepares the AQAR, documents the required information for NAAC accreditation and takes the initiative to apply for the NIRF ranking. Academic audit conducted under the aegis of IQAC helps the Department(s) to improve their curricular and extracurricular activities.

From among the various quality initiatives of the IQAC, two practices that have been institutionalized are:

1. **Induction Training programmes for newly recruited staff:** The IQAC has established a norm of organising one week induction training programmes for newly recruited Teaching and Non Teaching Staff. The aim of the programme is to orient the probationary staff with values to help the institution achieve its aims and objectives, to impart basic knowledge about the present system of Collegiate education and the functioning of the College, to enhance people skills and technical competence in the academic arena, to introduce KSR and related matters and to impart quality consciousness in the academic spheres. The programmes have structured syllabi and schedules with the stated outcome of grooming the new staff into the niceties of the job at hand and to ensure the first and foremost commitment of the staff to the institution.

Three programmes of its kind have been organised since 2018:

Induction Training programme for Non-teaching Staff - 05 to 09 November 2018

Induction Training programme for Non-teaching Staff - 14 to 18 October 2019

Induction Training Programme for Teaching Staff - 08 to 12 June 2020

2. **Feedback Mechanism**: The College has a formal mechanism of obtaining feedback from students, parents and alumni to evaluate the efficacy of the programmes and services provided by the College. The system is developed and modified by the IQAC. The IQAC takes the lead in gathering feedback: from the students, regarding teacher performance and the curriculum from parents and alumni regarding quality related institutional processes and from faculty members and nonteaching staff. Feedback from parents is obtained through PTA meetings conducted both in the college level and in the department level. Through an open forum provided during these meetings, the parents are free to express their views about the college and about the programmes conducted in the college. Both criticisms and suggestions and noted down by the principal/HODs and measures to improve the same are taken. The feedback on curriculum is collected from students and stakeholders and these are communicated to the University through the Board of studies members during the syllabus revision.

Data collected is analysed and the suggestions/recommendations generated are forwarded to the Staff Council for further action. The institutional feedback garnered helps improve the infrastructural facilities of the college. The institutional feedback also helps in improving administration and governance. Teacher feedback helps the teachers to work on their short comings, if any.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms

6.5.2.1 Describe any two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching learning reforms facilitated by the IQAC within a maximum of 500 words each

The IQAC, the Staff Council, CLMC and DLMC continuously review the teaching learning processes of the college. The yearly academic audit conducted by the college and the academic audits conducted by Management also reviews the overall performance of the college including Department wise University results, achievements of students, activities organised and the outcomes reached etc. Apart from this participation in various accreditation and ranking processes helps the IQAC in obtaining a clear cut picture of the strengths and weaknesses in our teaching learning processes.

Based on the various review processes, timely reforms are implemented. Given below details of a few of such reforms.

#### Implementation of MOODLE Learning Management System:

The need for a learning management system to co-ordinate the teaching learning activities in an effective manner was identified in 2018. Following it the MOODLE Learning Management System was integrated with the college website in 2018. For effective use of the platform, two IQAC members were deputed to attend the Short term Course on Learning Management System and MOOCS organized by the UGC HRDC Thiruvananthapuram in March 2019. Following the training programme IQAC instructed all the teachers of the college to login to the MOODLE LMS of the college and to enroll srudents. IQAC provided timely guidelines and support in the process. The use of MOODLE among teachers and students has now become an integral part of teaching learning activities. Especially during the Lock Down period, the teachers could easily adapt to the online teaching learning processes, as the teachers and students had prior experience in handling the teaching learning processes online through MOODLE.

**Online Question Paper Bank of Previous Year University Examinations:** It was identified that if the students are given online access to previous years University question papers, it will be too much beneficial for them in the examination point of view. Especially slow learners can identify the questions which are more important as far as the examinations are concerned, by working out questions of the previous years. So IQAC instructed the Examination cell to collect the question papers from 2015 onwards of all the PG and UG courses of the college. With the whole-hearted co-operartion of the Examination Cell, a portal was implemented on the college website, where the students can easily access these question papers. The IQAC monitors and makes sure that the portal is being updated regularly. The portal is benefitting not only the students and teachers of the college, but also the public.

**Moore Initiative for Competitive Examinations Training:** IQAC has identified that the percentage of students getting placement in the college is very less. One of the major reason for this is that majority of students in the college are from a rural background and so have less access to competitive examinations Orientation. So to tackle the problem, IQAC instructed the Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college to initiate Training Programmes in Competitive Examinations for the students. In 2017, competitive examinations training programme started in the College and are benefitting the students.

7.1.3.1 Describe efforts towards waste management on campus within a maximum of 500 words each

The initiatives taken by the College towards Waste Management are listed below.

Solid waste management (Link to Photos):

- **Solid Waste Management Plant**: A solid waste management plant has been installed in the campus by the support of the Thazhakkara Village Panchayat.
- Vermi compost and Biocompostplant : The wastes produced on the campus like shredded paper, used teabags, food waste, vegetables, etc. were sorted and used for the production of bio compost.
- **Biogas plant in college ladies' hostel**: 50 % of the energy used for cooking purpose from biogas plant
- Awareness: Awareness campaign for first year students at the time of joining are given for effective waste disposal. Notice boards are displayed to make students aware of properly disposing the waste. Students are encouraged to bring lunch in tiffin boxes and discourage them for the usage of plastic wraps for packing lunch. Awareness classes are also led as part of NSS, Bhoomithrasena and NCC.
- **Waste pits**: Separate food waste disposal pits are made available and they are periodically cleaned.
- Dust bins: Dustbins are made available in campus and classrooms
- **Incinerator Facility:** Incinerator is provided in the women rest room for the effective disposal of sanitary napkins.

Liquid, Hazardous and E-waste Management :

- Hazardous wastes are not permitted to spread into the surrounding water and soil. They are safely disposed or buried deeply, according to the intensity of hazards
- Soak pits are built for discharging waste water from laboratories
- Hazardous chemicals like Ethidium Bromide are neutralised using decontaminating solutions before disposal.
- Lab assistants handling hazardous chemicals are trained to use them efficiently and to control spillage, if any.
- Computers, printers and other ICT equipments are purchased via buy back offers.
- Useful parts of damaged equipments are reused wherever possible.
- Pen drives are recommended in place of CDs for data storage.
- No major E-waste is generated. The very agencies/shops from which electronic goods are sourced are encouraged to take it back after its life is over.

The waste management as well as green-clean campus activities is monitored by the SAP (Swachhta Action Plan) Cell consisting of 10 faculty members and 50students working as part of the Social Entrepreneurship, Swachhta and Rural Engagement Cell of the Mahatma Gandhi National

Council for Rural Education (MGNCRE), Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. The College has been recently awarded the One District-One Green Champion Award for its SAP activities, which was announced on 22 April 2021, during the Earth Day Celebrations of the MGNCRE.

7.1.4.1 Describe efforts towards rain water harvesting on the campus within a maximum 500 words <u>The rain water harvesting project</u> is one of the prestigious projects of Bishop Moore College, which not only prevents water scarcity in the campus but also provides a sense of water conservation and environment conciousness among students.

The College bagged the prestigious 'Palathully Award' by 'Malayala Manorama' in 2010, for the conservation of rain water for preventing the water scarcity of the Kallumala region.

As part of the rain water harvesting system of the college, soak pits are dug around the buildings to harvest rain water. Two rain water harvesting tanks are installed in the campus. The collected water is utilized for well recharging. Roof water harvesting is done from the Auditorium building from which water reaches the tanks from where they are used for various purposes. A fraction of collected water is used in chemistry laboratory.

The ground water recharging system ensures a steady level of water in the wells of the campus as well as those in the nearby locality.

The Water Harvesting System, Rain Pits and the green campus are good models through which we exhibit the message of environment education.

7.1.5.1 Describe efforts towards green practices on the campus within a maximum of 500 words The college campus is serene and picturesque with a beautiful garden, pond, trees and plants, and greenery around. There is a substantial green cover maintained in the campus with rare and endangered species of trees preserved. A full time gardener is appointed in the campus to take care of plants and trees. All measures are adopted to maintain the campus green, clean and ecofriendly. The College has been recently awarded the One District-One Green Champion Award by the MGNCRE, Ministry of Education, Govt of India.(Link to Green Campus Pictures)

The NSS unit and Bhoomithrasena Club actively participates in afforestation and greening programmes in the campus and community. As part of sensitizing the students on environmental issues, various programmes are organized in the college as well out-reach programmes are conducted. The College has been awarded the best Bhoomithrasena Unit Award in 2017 and 2018 by the Directorate of Environment and Climate Change, Government of Kerala.

#### **Green Practices in the Campus:**

 <u>Use of steel, plates, cups and spoons</u>: Disposable plates and glasses are banned in the campus. All the Departments/Clubs/Associations make use of the steel vessels for providing food during the conduct of seminars/conferences/Refresher courses. 100 steel plates and cups are available for this purpose with the Department of Physics, 100 plates, cups and spoons are available with the Bhommithrasena Club to serve the pupose

2. <u>Plastic free campus:</u> "Beat the Plastic" Plastic free campaign are organised by NSS and
Bhoomithrasena volunteers. They clean the premises of campus once in a week and and
collect plastic pens, refills, wrappers, carry bags, kits etc and compiles in the dust bin and
used for recycling. In 2019 paper pens were made by National service scheme volunteers
and were distributed among students to promote the massive movement for plasic free
campus. Paper bag trainings are regularly organised for students and Kudumbasree
members.

3. <u>'Shanthisthal'</u>: a project in which a protected area is maintained to conserve the natural ecosystem in 2018. An Eco Garden and a Medicinal plant garden was also constructed in the College campus.

4. **Use of bicycles and car pooling:** Almost 5 % of the staffs and students are coming to college by bicycles About 70% of staffs and 85% of students are using public transport systems like trains and buses. Car pooling is a green practice existing in the college for staff coming from Kottayam, Kollam, Adoor, etc.

- 5. <u>Pedestrian friendly roads</u>: All the roads inside the campus are pedestrian friendly. Entry of vehicles inside the campus are prohibited

#### 7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describeat least two institutional best practices

7.2.1.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the institution

1. STARS (Students and Alumni for a Responsible Society) Social outreach should be the bedrock of an academic institution's core values. To put this philosophy into practice, the

IQAC of the College has instituted a student's collective that relentlessly works towards social emancipation. A core group of 40 studentsare groomed under reputed alumni and teachers who make meaningful social interventions.

For instance, during the floods which ravaged the state in August 2018 shortage of basic needs in relief camps was bridged by distributing food, clothing and other essentials. 20 students who were severely affected by the flood were provided compensations of Rs. 5000, Rs. 25,000, Rs. 50,000 according to the extent of damage. A flood proof house was constructed for a student residing in a flood prone area.

Moreover, 10 best outgoing students are selected through a four-level selection process and three are adjudged as the "Stars of Moore". The first level of selection is a written test. The second level is a verification of the academic and cocurricular achievements of those selected in the first level. Those selected at the second level are groomed for interviews and group discussions. The third level is a personal interview conducted by a reputed panel through which 10 students are selected for thegrand finale which is an open stage performance round. The cumulative score of the final three rounds decides the three STARS of MOORE who are facilitated by eminent people in 'PATHEYAM', a grand public programme.

2. StEP (STAFF ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME) Employee satisfaction and productivity are inextricably linked to each other. That is why plethora of activities are designed to achieve this goal. Retreats are conducted by IQAC with the support of the College Management for the intellectual and spiritual orientation of the teachers. The teachers are encouraged by the IQAC to undertake research projects, attend and make presentations in conferences, publish books and articles, take up Research Guideship and take up assignments outside the College for the larger social good. The result of such practices is visible in the long list of achievements that the faculty of the College has been able to notch up every year.

The College has a Staff Recreation Room, rich with indoor games like Caroms, Chess, Table Tennis and a small library.Besides this, there is an indoor badminton court which is abuzz with activity after working hours. The College Staff is also encouraged to make use of the basketball court in the College Hostel and also the College Cricket/Football ground. Every year the College arranges for a Staff Recreation Tour to a place of verdant beauty. This has proved to a very successful detoxifying measure and an immensely successful team building activity. The College has conducted one-week induction training programmes for the newly recruited Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff. They were groomed into the niceties of the job at hand. The College also has a functioning Cooperative Society that chips in with help when the chips are down in form of monetary exigency for the employees.

The College has a long history of charting a course that would ensure that its vision to be a centre of excellence and to be a catalyst in facilitating a holistic development of youth with international standards, edified with the sanctity of truth, equipped to serve, grounded on Christian ideals, is always achieved and bettered. The College ensures the holistic development of the students in the academic, cocurricular and extra-curricular aspects, as well as in grooming them to be responsible citizens with social commitment, keeping up ethical standards based on Christian ideals.

The IQAC of the College, in sync with the various Departments, Clubs and Committees has institutionalised several activities that would **transform the students into responsible and contributing global citizens**.

The students are inspired to take up leadership roles in projects like zero plastic campus and nature conservation activities of a similar kind through the BhoomitrasenaSena Scheme, Nature Club and the National Service Scheme, all of which is monitored by the IQAC of the College.

The students are given career orientation programmes and trained in Skill Developmentthrough initiatives like the Additional Skill Development Programme (ASAP).

The College realises that excellence can be achieved only when women, who form the bulk of the students of the College, are empowered. The IQAC of the College through the Women's Cell and the Women's Study Unit of the college conduct myriad activities throughout the year to achieve this purpose.

International and National Conferences, workshops, seminars and lectures are organised regularly to impart the latest developments in academic and research fields. Graduate and Post Graduate students are given opportunities to carry out Summer Research projects at reputed institutions like the Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bangalore, Indian Science Academies, Indian Institute of Space Science and Technology (IIST) and the IITs.

Along with the intelligence quotient and emotional quotient, spiritual quotient is equally important. Each day therefore, starts with a morning prayer and a chapel service is conducted on every Wednesday, during which the College Chaplain teaches on the Christian ideals

8.1.3 Programmes organized by institution for the empowerment of socially and economically backward sections

8.1.3.1 Initiatives / programmes conducted for empowerment of socially and economically backward students in the institution over the last five years.

Student Aid Fund (SAF)

SAF is collected through the voluntary contributions from teachers to provide free lunch, study materials, medical help, financial help for study tours and other need-based assistance to the students who hail from economically poor background and whose financial resources are limited. The awareness that some students were skipping their meals due to paucity of resources led the members of the faculty to come up with the idea of the Student Aid Fund. Individual contributions are received from teachers or deducted from their salary every month, as per their request, and this amount is distributed according to the need of the students. Needy students are identified by their mentors and their names are handed over to the teacher in charge of the SAF and those teacher then hands over to the concerned student, the food coupons, money or study materials, as the case may be. No public mention is made of the same so as to maintain the anonymity of the student.

#### **Flood relief**

The catastrophic floods that ravaged Kerala in the year 2018 had affected the students of this institution also. Twenty-seven students were identified to be severely affected by the disaster and after evaluating the extent of loss that occurred to each of them, financial assistance of Rs. 50000 each was provided to two among them, Rs. 25000 each for five students and Rs. 5000 each to the remaining 20 students. As part of College Flood Relief activities, the foundation stone for a Student House Project was laid on 5 April 2018. Ninety-five percentage of the house project has been completed till date, through donations from students, teachers and well-wishers.

## Financial help during the pandemic

Regular College education was the biggest casualty because of the Covid 19 Pandemic. Teaching shifted to the online mode after the national lockdown. However, several students were not able to afford the electronic devices necessary to participate in the online transaction of knowledge. The College stepped in to ease their worries by providing financial support to many students to purchase mobile phones and setting up the necessary infrastructure for enabling them to carry on with their studies.

8.1.3.2 Steps taken to increase the proportion of socially and economically backward categories in academic and non academic staff in the institution

The Recruitment of the Teaching Staff is strictly in compliance with the UGC, State Government Regulations and University Statutes. The non-teaching staff recruitment follows the University Statutes and Government norms. Being a minority institution the reservation policies for backward community are not applicable in recruitment of the staff.

and their names are recommended for Institutional scholarships, special programmes like WWS, SSP, ASAP, peer teaching, etc. Career Guidance as well as personal guidance is also provided to enhance their level of confidence. Fee concessions are made available to them and other Government grants are recommended. If students are from remote areas, hostel facilityis provided to them free of cost.

The feedback received for these community-based activities of the college is very positive and the same suggests that these incentives have motivated the parents coming from educationally backward community to send their children for higher studies to this institution.

8.6.2 Gender empowerment measures

8.6.2.1 Describe gender sensitivity facilities provided by the institution in areas like a) Safety and Security b) Counselling c) Common Room and other amenities

The college ensures the safety of the girl students during the entire stretch of their stay in the campus. There is a Discipline Committee entrusted with the charge of taking rounds in the college everyday with the specific objective of looking into the safety and security of the girl students. There are surveillance cameras installed in the campus by means of which all activities within the precincts of the college are directly monitored by the Principal. The college has a Women's hostel with a full-time warden.

The Women's Centre of the college has a Counselling chamber attached to it where the students can avail the services of a part-time Counsellor who visits the center once a week. The Counsellor provides guidance and necessary psychological as well as emotional support which has proved to immensely beneficial to the students. In addition to the professional Counsellor, the respective class wardens also regularly interact with them to ensure the mental and emotional well-being of the students.

The college boasts of a well-equipped Women's Centre with facilities like first aid, a sick room, a water purifier, a counselling chamber and a staff member to cater to the needs of the girl students of the college. Sanitary napkins are provided to the students at a nominal price and an incinerator for the disposal of used ones is also installed. A tailoring unit and a binding unit also form part of the Women's Centre of the college. The washroom of the college is maintained in a hygienic manner

and water is made available round the clock.

8.6.2.2 Mechanism for resolving gender related issues

The college is aware of the scale of challenge it is faced with while educating young people in a coeducational institution. Gender equity is one aspect to which the college is unequivocally committed. Hence the college has myriad committees constituted exclusively to look into gender specific issues. There is a Women Empowerment Committee (formerly known as the Women's Cell) with members from both teaching and non-teaching staff, which devises measures to equip the students who are poised to enter the workforce. The Women's Study Unit, constituted as a part of the extension activity of the college, plays an active role in ensuring economic independence and self-reliance of the girl students. The Committee Against Sexual Harassment, which includes members of the Staff Grievances Redressal Cell and the Students' Grievances Redressal Cell, functions as a watchdog against any offensive approaches or actions that might impinge on the integrity and self-respect of the girl students in the campus. The Students' Grievances Redressal Cell considers and takes actions on the complaints related to the curricular and extracurricular issues of all the students in general and girl students in particular. The Anti-ragging Cell of the college keeps a stern watch and takes stringent action in case of any instances of complaints related to ragging. In addition to availing the services of a professional Counsellor, the college has a Counselling Cell aimed at bolstering the students' welfare and promoting their interests.

8.6.2.3 Describe gender empowerment (action oriented) measures carried out in your institution over last five years

Education changes lives and empowers women in multiple ways. The effect of changes in education on women is real and fundamental. A well-formed mind will enable them to face the various challenges thrown up in life and overcome the hurdles confidently. Gender has always been an obvious reason for the denial of education. The college aspires at bridging the gender gap and bringing in equity by encouraging students to not only gain university education, but also to develop their employability skills. **'Ideal Campus through the Empowerment of Women'** is the idea that motivates the college community in its march towards excellence.

The Women's Cell and Women's Study Unit of the college are actively engaged in activities aimed at enhancing the skills and **improving the employability** of the students. Inspired by the motto "To Equip and to Ennoble", the college provides opportunities to the students to showcase their talents and to take part in training sessions thereby enabling them to advance their future prospects. Financial independence is the gateway to empowerment. Being located in a rural area, the college is aware of the scale of challenge it is faced with in empowering the students, majority of those who hail from fragile socio-economic echelons. As a part of employment generation at the individual level, students are regularly given hands-on training on tailoring, binding, handicrafts, detergent-making and other related aspects of cottage industry, for a beginning. Students are encouraged to register with the Public Service Commission and PSC question papers are also discussed by the members of the Women's Study Unit. As an initiative of equipping the students to face physical threats, selected students were given Self Defense training sessions under the aegis of the Women's Cell and the women's wing of Kerala police in 2018 and the Junior Chamber International (JCI), Mavelikara in 2020 respectively. Anti-drug campaigns in the form of lectures and plays conducted on the college campus served to create awareness about the various social and psychological consequences of drug abuse which proved particularly enabling for girl students as women are the primary victims of such anti-social behavior in society. In addition, the students are given opportunities to meet and interact with eminent personalities from various fields like medicine, law, social work and politics which enhance their understanding and attribute to the overall development of the individual.

8.6.2.4 Feedback from students and staff on the gender sensitization/empowerment programmes Women's Cell and Women's Study Unit function very actively in the campus and plans women empowerment activities in the college as well as community. The feedback related to gender senzitisation programmes are collected through both formal and informal mechanisms.

The college has a formal mechanism to obtain feedback on the efficacy of the services and programmes offered by the College. From 2017 onwards, feedback is collected online from the students at the end of even semesters. The feedback form asks the students to assess the College on myriad aspects including Infrastructure, Teaching Quality, Extension Activities, Gender Sensitization Programme, Environmental friendliness, etc.

As per the feedback collected from students in 2018-19, 40% of the students have rated the gender senzitisation programmes in the college as Very Good and 48% of the students have given a rating Good. Only 2% of the students commented the measures in the college towards women empowerment as below average.

The feedback analysis on this regard for the academic year 2019-20 shows that 99% of the students rate the women empowerment activities in the college to be above average.

Feedback from staff and students are also collected through informal mechanisms. The feedbacks received are given due importance and are incorporated in the further action plan of the activities.

9.2.2.5 Measures taken by institutions to bridge the achievement gap of students

The College has implemented warden system effectively, whereby, a teacher is in charge of a class, monitoring the students closely and attending to their specific needs. A record of the same is maintained through "Mentees Chronicle", a register that covers all aspects of the students prior to joining the college and traces their progress in the college as well. It includes their academic performance, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, one to one meetings are held with students, parents etc.

The College conducts the Scholar Support Program that is meant to identify and support weak students. Those from socio-economically backward sections are given special attention. The College provides them with a support system that enables them to come up in academics as well as in life. A preliminary test is conducted to identify the students who are weak in their subjects. They are provided special classes, simplified notes and handouts. Peer teaching is also encouraged and carried out most effectively. Guidance and counselling, if required, is provided by the teachers and also by a professional counselor who visits the college according to a given schedule. They are also given preference for attending life skill programs organised by the college. Their progress is evaluated and assured by means of tests conducted towards the end of the year.

Walk with Scholar programme was effectively conducted in which selected students were given special sessions on personality development, time management, career guidance, etc. The Walk With a Scholar Programme – an initiative of the Higher Education Department, Government of Kerala, was taken up by Bishop Moore College in 2014-15, in which 30 students were mentored by five internal mentors. 60 students were enrolled in the programme in 2015-16 and were guided by ten internal mentors. In 2016-17, 90 students were guided by 15 mentors and in 2018-19, 90 students were mentored by 15 mentors.

Additional Skills Acquisition Programme is also organised every year for students to equip themselves with soft skills. Students, who lacked communication skills were identified and special consideration was given for students from economically and socially backward sections in the selection procedure. Sessions on soft skills and related sessions were provided for them. The efforts of the ASAP team were rewarded when the Department of Higher Education, Government of Kerala upgraded Bishop Moore College, from the status of a four star training institute to the five star category in 2016.

9.3.1.4 Describe steps taken and technologies used for the conservation of rare collections and specimens etc

The College effectively ensures the conservation of its collection of artifacts and other objects of scientific importance which are primarily preserved in the Botany and Zoology museums attached to the respective departments. In addition to this, the institution has a Greenhouse which allows the College to preserve seasonal and delicate plants all through the year by protecting them from the vagaries of weather. The Bhoomithrasena club and MIGPC (Moore Initiative for Gene Pool Conservation) are other initiatives of the college directed at conservation of biodiversity.

The Botanical Museum of the college contains preserved specimens of biological importance. It includes marine and fresh water algae, microscopic and macroscopic fungi, rare collections of bryophytes, pteridophytes, gymnosperms, morphological and anatomical specimens of angiosperms. Variety of plants ranging from *Trichpuszeylanicus* (Arogyapacha), *Rauvolfiaserpintina*, *Zamia* and *Cycasrumphi* are found in the museum.

The Zoological Museum is an abode of artifacts and rare collection of exhibits including various

species of stuffed animals, birds, skeletons, etc. which have been systematically categorized and documented. The museum has a collection of more than 10,000 specimens in various modes of preservation (animals in fixing fluids, dried or specially prepared animals, stuffed animals, skeletons and articles made from horns, shells, etc.). These are displayed yearly for school children to gain a basis for research on evolution, speciation and distribution.

The Green House of the College hosts a collection of rare and endangered plants with a full-time gardener to take care of the plants. The forty-year old Greenhouse is a model to uphold. *A Green Campus*, a book published with exclusive photographs is a documentation of the flora of the college.

The Bhoomithrasena club of the college, an initiative by the Government of Kerala aimed at conservation of environment, is dedicatedly engaged in organizing seminars, debates, lectures and arranging field visits to wildlife parks and environmentally sensitive areas. The club is proactive in conducting programmes aimed at preserving the surroundings and protecting the environment by cleaning the polluted or environmentally degraded sites, and by planting and maintaining trees in the campus. The Bhoomithrasena Club has been functioning in the college with the financial support of the Directorate of Environment and Climate Change, Government of Kerala. The College unit, started in the year 2010, has been successful in meeting the objective of raising awareness about the need for responsible environmental behaviour and piloting many a project in this direction.

Mushroom culture, an initiative of the Zoology department, is aimed at encouraging responsible entrepreneurship.

MIGPC, Moore Initiative for Gene Pool Conservation was inaugurated on 18 November 2017. Under this initiative, hybrid varieties of paddy seeds and jackfruit were sown in a specially prepared field.

The campus is a home for diverse species of trees. Some of them are:

- 1. Dilleniaindica or Elephant apple
- 2. Parkiabiglandulosa or Badminton Ball Tree
- 3. Vateriaindica or White Dammar, a threatened species
- 4. Cochlospermumreligiosum or Silk-cotton tree
- 5. Eriobotrya japonica or Lakkottapazham (Loquat)
- 6. Couroupitaguianensis or Cannonball Tree
- 7. Rauwolfiaserpentina or Wonder Drug in the treatment of Systolic Hypertension.

9.3.1.5 Describe the heritage of the institution towards cultural, social and moral fabric of society The institution is part of the two-hundred year old tradition of the CMS Missionaries who had dedicated their lives for the upliftment of the downtrodden by touching on all aspects of life. The College, founded in 1964, is named after the fourth Anglican missionary, Bishop Edward Alfred Livingstone Moore, a visionary whose motto was to be selfless to the core. His altruism was a consolation and hope for the poor and the marginalized, a tradition which is carried on by the institution. The institution aims to be a beacon of hope and aspiration for the less privileged in the society by being instrumental in facilitating their social mobility. Imparting education to the marginalized is one of the mission statements of the College. The College offers platforms for activities like Unnath Bharath Abhiyan, NSS, NCC, flood relief camps etc., an overall involvement in all the events in the society.

**Unnath Bharath Abhiyan:** Bishop Moore College is a part of Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, an initiative of the Ministry of Education, Government of India. Being the year of the Covid 19 pandemic outbreak, the first and immediate step on being empanelled under this programme was to provide 1000 masks

and 1000 bottles of sanitizers to the Mavelikara municipality. The college has adopted 5 villages including the one in which the college is located under this scheme.

**Writings:** "Global Voices and Cultures" is a book co-edited by Mr. Amith David, Assistant Professor of English, which contains a selection of writings in different genres around the world. It intends to introduce the readers to the rich panorama of experience

**NSS/NCC:** The NSS and NCC wings of the college try to awake social consciousness among the students by providing them opportunities to work with and among the people.emanating from different cultures and embodied through literature.

**Flood Relief:** The staff and students played a laudable role in the flood relief activities at Chengannoor and Mavelikkara in actively offering help in the evacuation of people from affected areas, locating and directing rescue team to the needy, giving necessary food, clothes and other items to relief camps during the testing times of the 2018 floods. A Student House Project was taken up by the college wherein a plan to construct a house for an affected student was charted in 2018 and successfully completed in 2021.

In keeping with its tradition of maintaining the secular fabric and communal harmony, the college makes it a point to celebrate all the major festivals like Onam and Christmas as well as national days like the Independence Day and Republic Day. 'Kalajadha' which showcases the rich cultural heritage of the state is one of the main attractions among the programmes of the College Arts Festival.

**Students Aid Fund:** Under this scheme, the College provides mid-day meals and financial assistance for purchasing books to deserving students.

9.3.1.6 Describe the various cultural heritage schemes /other government schemes in the institutions

The Malayalam Department of the college has established the George Mathen Academy, a memorial instituted in reverence of Rev. George Mathen, one of the pioneering missionaries of Kerala and a doyen of Malayalam language and literature. The Academy houses his writing desk and few books. The George Mathen Academy has been hosting memorial lectures in his honour from 1984 onwards. The publication wing of the academy started functioning on 18 June 2018 with the publication of the book *Sahityavichithanangal* by Prof. Johnson Chemmenem. To commemorate the two hundredth birth anniversary of Rev. George Mathen, a book in his honour titled *Rev. George Mathanum Vyakaranavum*, written by Dr. Sudha Mary Thomas, was released by the honourable Chief Minister Sri. Pinarayi Vijayan and State Education Minister Prof. Raveendranath in 2019. The Academy is now charting new waters and expanding its knowledge horizon with the introduction of a new academic journal titled *Malayazhma* which would carry research articles from both English and Malayalam disciplines.

Bishop Moore College is affiliated to the University of Kerala. So the Centralized admission procedure of the University is strictly followed by the College. The sanctioned seats for each programme are earmarked for the various categories in the following manner: General Category (50%), SC (15%), ST (5%), Community Quota (10%) and Management Quota (20%).

Students submit their applications to the various Degree/PG programmes in the Kerala University Admission Portal and the University allots rank lists for admission, based on the index marks of the students. The admissions are carried out in several allotments, as per the instructions and rank lists provided by the University.

The College Union, run by the students, is the students' body which is constituted as per University regulations. The Union is created to represent fellow students in some fashion with a clear mandate to be a part of journey of the institute's endeavor to improve academic and administrative deliverable. 9.5.1.2 Describe the staff union activities in the institution

Bishop Moore College functions cordially and unitedly as a family and all decisions are made unanimously. Staff union play a significant role in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the

institutional process. The Staff union plans the curricular and extracurricular activities of the College and puts forward necessary proposals for infrastructure development for meeting the needs of teaching and learning community.

Staff union organizes annual staff picnics and promotes sports, games and cultural activities for staff. During February 2020, the <u>Bishop Moore College Staff Cricket team defeated Alappuzha</u> <u>Carmel Polytechnic College team</u> and qualified to the next round in the Teacher's Cricket league held at St. Michael College. The team was awarded <u>Fair play award</u>, though the team lost the match.

Staff union provides free lunch, study materials, medical help, financial help for study tours and other need-based assistance to students. Financial support is provided for construction of houses and to meet medical expenses of students and staffs.

Under the auspices of Staff Union, Lunch and Get together are arranged during Festival occasions. Farewell meeting for retiring staff are also organized by the Staff Union. During the demise of retired staff members, the Staff Union makes necessary arrangements including transportation facilities for staff to reach the sorrowing home, honoring the remains, meeting financial crisis if any etc.

A co-operative society is functioning in the college under the Staff Union. The various financial schemes of the Satff Co-operative Society is a shelter for both the teaching and non-teaching staff during personal financial crisis.

The objective of the Grievances Redressal Cell is to develop a responsive and accountable attitude among all the stakeholders in order to maintain a harmonious educational atmosphere in the institute. It is constituted for the redressal of the problems reported by the Students of the College with the following objectives:

The College boasts of a huge library with over 52,000 titles. It provides the students with a variety of academic and non-academic books and journals that are accessible to the students. The students can also put forward their opinions on including any book/journal that would help them in their course of study and on improving the library facilities through a student representative.

9.6.2 Outcome Based Education(OBE)

9.6.2.1 Describe Course Outcomes (COs) for all courses and mechanism of communication within a minimum of 500 characters and maximum of 500 words

Outcome Based Education is the end result of our prescribed syllabus. The Open Courses provided help students to understand other subjects in addition to their own. Projects done by the students enhance their experiential learning and give hands on training to them in their respective fields of study. It helps them to understand the concepts better and enable them to think deeper and out of the box. The subjects like Environmental studies help make them more responsible to the world around us. When students from the arts group are given a chance to learn such topics, it gives a new insight for them. When science students have this subject, they understand that our plants and animals are not mere specimens and they start seeing the environment in a different light.

Our various club activities make our students sensitive to the pressing needs of the society. For example, the clubs like Science Club, Nature Club, Bhoomithra Club, NSS, etc.. make the students thrive deeper into the environmental issues and to know the importance of sustaining the nature. The Debate club and the Literary club also do their part in raising awareness on the burning challenges faced by the society. It provides a platform for the students to have a discussion on such topics and brainstorm themselves on any possible solutions and suggestions.

Our skills training and induction programmes equip our students to be better individuals. It helps them improve their talents and build self-confidence.

9.6.2.2 Describe the method of measuring attainment of POs in not more than 500 words and the level of attainment of POs

The attainment of Programme Outcomes are measured using various methods which include Internal Examinations, External Examinations, Project, Seminars, Assignments, participation in other academic endeavors. The College efficient mechanisms to conduct the Internal Assessment system as well as External Examinations as per University norms.

The Staff Council and the CLMC (College Level Monitoring Committee) meet regularly to organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. The College has an academic calendar, the College hand book and calendar which has the details of the faculty, the course structure, the fee structure and a year planner. Teaching plan is prepared at the beginning of the semester. The CLMC give directives to the internal assessment system of the College. An internal exam is conducted for the students before every semester exam, as part of the internal assessment. The students are also assessed based on the assignments, seminars and the projects that they complete during the course of the programme. For PG students, individual supervisors are allotted to each student to guide them with the project.

9.6.2.3 Describe the method of measuring attainment of PSOs in not more than 500 words and the level of attainment of PSOs

Among the various assessment tools to verify course outcomes, conducting systematic Internal Exams and University End Semester Exams are the two prominent methods. Internal Evaluation System: The Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system is monitored by the College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC). The Principal as the Chairperson, Heads of departments, elected representatives of teachers in the College Council and a student representative constitutes the CLMC. A member selected by the CLMC from among the Heads of the Departments shall be the Convener.

Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) consisting of the Head of the Department and all teachers of the Department shall monitor the conduct of Courses and evaluation under CIE. The Head of the Department shall be the Chairperson and a teacher selected by DLMC from among the members shall be the Convener.

The College has a highly efficient Internal Examination Cell under the governance of CLMC for the smooth conduct of Centralized Internal Examination. The CLMC selects two faculties as the Coordinators of the Internal Examination cell. They are responsible for the preparation of time table and invigilation duty list, collection of question papers from concerned course advisors, sorting of question papers, smooth conduct of examination and the distribution of answer scripts to concerned faculties. The Internal Examination Cell, DLMC, and CLMC jointly announce the dates for the distribution of corrected answer scripts to the students. Thus, they make sure that the outcomes stated in the syllabus are assured. The College also offers facilities to solve their grievances regarding internal examination scores.

Attending the internal examination is mandatory. Retest is conducted for students who have not attended the same due to genuine reasons. Internal Examination for post graduate students is conducted at the department level. The institution strictly follows the criteria given by the University for Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE).

Assignments, Seminars, laboratory work and project work undertaken are the other methods used toanalyze the outcome of the courses. Each of these is properly guided by the faculty so that the students can give their maximum output. Consistent feedback and surveys from various stakeholders are evaluated and methods are changed, if necessary.

9.6.2.4 Describe the method of measuring attainment of COs in not more than 500 words and the level of attainment of COs

The course outcome is monitored by Faculty Advisors of each course. They plan and prepare the methods in which assignments, seminars and test papers are to be given, which is meticulously followed by the others. The internal assessment is a testimonial to this fact. The Faculty Advisors look into it thoroughly and make innovative changes regarding the manner in which the above mentioned are conducted as and when necessary.

Faculty Advisors monitor the progress of their wards and intervene as and when necessary. Continuous assessment of the students is done consistently. The Heads of the Departments plan and fix the timetable every semester so that two or three faculty advisors share a paper and a class. The assessment of the progress of the students is thus monitored constantly.

# 10. Scientific temper and Secular outlook

10.1 Knowledge assimilation and dissemination process

10.1.1 Knowledge assimilation process

10.1.1.1 Steps taken by the institution for knowledge assimilation in your institution such as response to disaster management, Social Angle in Research and Knowledge Production(SARC), Knowledge Dissemination Response(KDR), Knowledge Action Decision Framework(KAD)

Bishop Moore College from its very inception itself had a special focus for knowledge assimilation and dissemination towards social welfare.

To make the faculty, students and the local community aware of response to disaster management, the College organized a National Seminar on "Scientific Solutions for Sustainable Rebuilding of Kerala in the post-flood scenario" in which Smt. Medha Patkar and Dr. M C Dathan were the keynote speakers.

Research is a major area where the College gives special emphasis to social benefit. The extent of benefit towards the immediate needs of the society is given special importance in the research project proposals put forward by the faculty.

Given below are a few specific examples of social angle in research.

- The faculty members of Chemistry succeeded in preparing <u>bio-degradable plastic from bio-polymers</u> like starch, soy protein, cellulose for packaging.
- The faculty members of the Department of Chemistry were able to <u>Develop a pH sensitive</u> <u>bio-degradable film</u> for monitoring freshness of packed pork and shrimp samples.
- The Research Centre of Chemistry could develop <u>Chitin nano whiskers</u> from prawn shell waste which has bio-medical application in the healing of wounds.
- <u>GenBank submissions</u>: Prakash G. Williams, Kavya K.S., Austin P., Arjun J.K. succeeded in identifying partial sequences of 16s rRNA from bacterial isolates. (MN566042-MN566049) and the same was submitted on 16.10.2019

Publications by faculty and students are another medium through which expertise of the institution is made available for the community. Around 70 publications as journals, books and book chapters have been published from the college over the last five years. A few knowledge books apart from scientific books are given below:

- "Global Voices and Cultures" is a book co-edited by Mr. Amith David, Assistant Professor of English
- "Cyber idavum Malayala Bhavanayum", "Kayyala", "Sahithya Vichinthanam", "Rev. George Mathenum Malayala Vyakaranavum" published by faculty in Malayalam

Faculty members serves as experts to various training progrmmes, Contests, Conferences organized by various agencies icluding Govt agencies.

 Dr Nair Anup Chandrasekharan, Assistant Professor of English, served as a Language <u>Expert</u> for the National Legislators' Conference organised by the Kerala Legislative Assembly in August, 2018, <u>a Language Expert for the "Festival of Democracy' celebrations</u> in February, 2019 at the Legislature Complex, Thiruvananthapuram, as the Resource <u>Person in the four-day course Designing and Module Development Workshop</u> from organised by SCERT.

The various Departments, as part of teaching learning processes, make use of their expertise and resources to give training for local community. A few examples are listed below.

• <u>Installation of Aquaponic system</u>: With a view to promote farming using aquacultured water, an aquaponics plant was installed in the campus. The plant gives a message towards more farming from less water. Training on aquaponics is organised regularly.

- <u>Mushroom cultivation</u> is promoted in a professional manner among the local community through specialised training offered by the college.
- <u>Sanitisers distributed to the public</u>- During the Covid 19 pandemic, the Institution used its Chemical laboratory to prepare and distribute sanitizers to the people, especially in the District Hospital, District Jail, Railway Station and other public places.

Sajan, Assistant Professor of Physics, has completed a <u>Collaborative Major Research</u> <u>Project</u> entitled "Growth, Optical Studies, Vibrational Spectral Investigations and Hydrogen Bond Studies of Semi Organic NLO Crystals for Laser Applications" in collaboration with Dr. R. Chithra, Scientist, UGC-DAE BARC.
- <u>Dr. Arun Aravind, Assistant Professor of Physics, was allotted beam time</u> for the project entitled "Investigations of swift heavy ion irradiations on structural, electrical and optical properties of RF-magnetron Cu sputter transition metal oxide thin films" by the Inter University Accelerator Centre, New Delhi.

The Club was formed under the patronage of ReActAsia pacific, an international agency working against antimicrobial resistance (AMR). Dr. Prakash G. Williams was nominated as the Faculty Nodal Officer of the Club. Prof. Alexander K Samuel, Syndicate Member, CUSAT; Dr Philip Mathew, Public Health Consultant, ReAct Asia Pacific, Mr. Vishal Philip Sam, Consultant, ReAct Asia Pacific addressed the gathering and educated the members about the consequences of AMR and the role that the club can play in creating public awareness.

The College has adopted five villages under the Unnath Bharath Abhiyan scheme of the Government of India. Mavelikara, Thekkekara Part, Kattanam CT, Bharanikkavu Part and Vettiyar

Training on Paper Bag making for Kudumbasree members are regularly organised by the Bhoomithrasena as part of the "Beat the Plastic" and paper bags are distributed among local shops.

<u>Training on mushroom farming</u> was organized for local community members for promoting entreupreunership among them.

Flash Mobs, Street plays and Rallies are regularly organised by NSS, NCC, College Union, Women's Cell among the public on topics related to Women Security, Renaissance, etc. On 30 January 2019, <u>a flash mob on "Renaissance"</u> was organised inside and ouside the campus by the College Union.On 11 december 2019, National Service Scheme conducted <u>a flash mob on "Stop Violence Against Women"</u>

- The College houses a <u>Zoological Museum, a Tissue Culture lab, a Green House</u> and a Herbarium to facilitate learning experiences.
- Students are given opportunities to take up <u>Student Summer Projects</u> in reputed National Research Institutes.
- The Science Graduate and Post-Graduate students are motivated to <u>avail financial support</u> <u>from KSCSTE Government</u> of Kerala to carry out their dissertation work.
- The students present their findings in the seminars and <u>publish their work in reputed</u> journals.
- Field Visits and Study Tours are conducted regularly by all departments.
- The College provides ample opportunities to students to engage in Extension activities.
- Opportunities for Certificate courses, Add-on courses and value-added courses are provided for the learners, enabling them to acquire additional certificates in course of their graduation.
- Our Teaching-Learning Processes are supported under various Government Schemes like DBT-STAR, DST-FIST, KSCSTE-SARD programmes.

- Science Students regularly undertake Summer Research Projects in reputed institutes. During the last five years, 22 students have completed their projects at IISc Bangalore, IIST Thiruvananthapuram, JNCASR Bangalore, RRI Bangalore, IGCAR Kalpakkam, IIT Gandhinagar, CSIR CECRI Karaikudi, etc
- The College regularly partners with the three Science Academies (IISc Bangalore, INSA New Delhi, NASI Allahabad) in organising Lecture Workshops, in which the fellows of the Science Academies' give lectures for students. The college has organised six lecture workshops during the last five years

- The **Memorandum of Understanding** with the Pushpagiri Research Centre promotes **innovative research** in the field of bio-medicine. A collaborative research project on 'Human Breast Milk Powder' funded by the Department of Biotechnology, Government of India is being conducted.
- The **DBT STAR College Scheme** of Rs. 33.5 lakhs has provided facilities and infrastructure for **innovative learning**, creating an **ecosystem for advanced knowledge sharing** at the

undergraduate level.

10.1.2.7 Describe the details of incubation centre and evidence of its usage (activity) within a maximum of 500 words

**Centre for Advanced Functional Materials (CAFM)** is an **incubation centre** for advanced research in functional materials in the Department of Physics, sanctioned in 2011 as an approved Research Centre of University of Kerala. The facilities provided by the centre include sophisticated instruments for synthesis, design and characterisation of organic, inorganic and nano materials including RF Sputtering Unit, High Temperature Furnace, Hydrothermal furnace, Autoclave, UV Vis Spectrophotometer, Photoluminescence Spectrophotometer, TGA DTA DSC Apparatus, FT IR Spectrophotometer, WorkStation computers, Spin coater, etc. There are 11 research scholars pursuing PhD under the guidance of four University approved Research Guides. The Centre has been supported by the DST FIST scheme of Govt of India and KSCSTE SARD scheme of Govt of Kerala. On an average, 10 research papers are published yearly, in peer reviewed International journals, from the centre. The centre has three functional MoUs with reputed industries whereby resources are exchanged. Four Doctoral Degrees have been produced by the centre.

**Centre for Nanoscience and Human Milk Research (CNHMR)** is an incubation centre for advanced research in synthesis of Biocomposite Films, Nano materials and human milk powder, sanctioned in 2009 as an approved research centre under the University of Kerala. There are 6 research scholars pursuing PhD under the guidance of 4 University approved research guides. The centre has been supported by DST FIST scheme of Government of India. The research centre has to its credit two Indian patents. The centre has executed several major and minor research projects funded by DST, KSCSTE and UGC. It has conducted various collaborative research projects with reputed institutions like Pushpagiri Research Centre, Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Technology etc., The centre has 2 ongoing projects of 40 lakhs and 31 lakhs respectively, funded by the DST and DBT, Government of India. More than 120 publications have been produced in peer reviewed international journals from the centre till date. In addition, more than 40 book chapters and 5 books have been edited by the centre. The centre has produced 4 Doctoral degrees.

Installation of Mushroom Farm: The department of Zoology has set up "Mushroom Farm" on December 2nd 2019. Mushroom cultivation was installed by the Vice Principal, Prof. Anu Mathews. The first fruit from the farm was offered to Rev. George Jacob (Chaplain). The farm has since then been generating good income.

10.1.2.8 Measures taken for promoting cross disciplinary literacy Activities specifically meant for promoting cross disciplinary literacy have been organized under various departments.

Given below is a list of activities aimed at ensuring cross disciplinary literacy among students and teachers .

1. The Open Course System in the Choice Based Credit and Semester System at the Undergraduate level gives opportunity for students to learn a course (58 hrs) outside their main stream of study.

2. Add On Courses and Certificate courses offered by the College are open to all the students.

3. Interdisciplinary lecture series was organized by the Department of English in September 2018. Dr. Jacob Chandy inaugurated the programme with a talk on "Disobedient Cells". (Link to details). Ms Susan George, Guest Lecturer, Dept of Malayalam conducted a talk on 'Mudiyettu' for the MA English students in 2019.

4.<u>Inter Departmental Competitions</u> including Painting, PowerPoint presentation, Poster Design, Quiz, Debates and various Club activities are conducted as part of the Department Associations.

5. The Interdisciplinary Research Committee promotes the Departments to undertake Major and Minor Research Projects as well as Student Research projects which have Interdisciplinary focus. The Instrumentation Facilities of the Research Centres are given a centralized access system, so that inter disciplinary research is facilitated. MSc projects are also promoted to have interdisciplinary studies sharing human resources as well as facilities among Departments.

- The monthly bulletin of Indian Academy of Physics teachers is circulated among students.
- The Department library is easily accessible to students.
- Physics Association every year prepares a magazine on any scientific topic and circulates among students. The latest manuscript released by the Physics Association was on the topic, "Artificial Intellegence-the Future of Everything" in 2020. The manuscript consisted of around 24 articles on AI, 32 articles on Robotics and 10 articles on Machine Learning prepared by the students. In the previous years the manuscripts named "DREAMS", "REFLECTIONS" and "RESONANCE" were released.
- Research scholars are motivated to do review of presentation on latest journal publications.
- In 2016 the Chemistry Association prepared a book on <u>"Nobel Lauretes in</u> <u>Chemistry(1901 -2016)</u>" and a revised "Lab Manual"

10.2 Social Participation

10.2.1 Socialization of knowledge and linkage with society

10.2.1.1 Measures taken for the socialization of knowledge and linkage with society and local self governments (LSG)

Kerala faced devastating floods in August 2018 and areas near the College were also affected. As part of our commitment, an assessment of Quality of Water after the floods from flood affected nearby villages was done By Pollution Control Board on 13-10-2018. The water samples were collected by students making field trips to the affected areas.

'Shasthrajalakam' was organised, which is a three day science enrichment programme for High School level Government/Aided students, sponsored by the State Institute of Education Technology(SIET), from 8th -10th November 2019

Programme for the promotion of excellence of Gifted Children in Mavelikara Education District was organised on 15th February 2020 in association with the State Institute of Education Technology, Government of Kerala

National Seminar on Scientific Solutions for Sustainable Rebuilding of Kerala in the Post Flood Scenario was organized by the Department of Physics, IQAC and DBT STAR College Scheme in association with Directorate of Environment & Climate Change (DoECC),Govt. of Kerala during 9-10 January 2020. The seminar was inaugurated by Dr. M. C. Dathan, Scientific Advisor to the Chief Minister of Kerala. Smt. Medha Patkar, founder member of Narmada Bachao Andolan delivered the keynote speech.

Bhoomithrasena club organised a training programme on 'Paper Bag Making' for the Kudumbasree members.

The college is a <u>recognized Social Entrepreneurship</u>, <u>Swachata & Rural Engagement Cell</u> (SES RC) of the Mahatma Gandhi National Council for Rural Education(MGNCRE), Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. The Committee of the college monitors and plans activities in the campus related to Waste Management, maintaining the green campus of the college, rain water harvesting and solar energy harvesting, post covid hygiene etc. The college was awarded the One District, One Green Champions Award recently by the MGNCRE, Govt, of India.

The College has adopted five villages under the <u>Unnath Bharath Abhiyan scheme</u> of the Government of India. Sanitizers and masks were provided in the wake of the pandemic. It was handed over to the Mavelikara Municipal Chairperson.

During the Covid 19 pandemic the Institution used its Chemical laboratory to prepare Sanitisers to distribute it among the society, especially the District Hospital, District Jail, Railway Station, Police Station and other public places.

10.2.1.2 Details of Social entrepreneurship developed to resolve the problems of the state/local community

<u>Installation of Mushroom Farm:</u> The department of Zoology has set up "Mushroom Farm" on December 2nd 2019. Mushroom cultivation was installed by the Vice Principal, Prof. Anu Mathews. The first fruit from the farm was offered to Rev. George Jacob (Chaplain). The farm has since then been generating good income.

The <u>Water Harvesting System</u>, Rain Pits and the green campus are good models facilitating the water supply in the college campus, thereby making water available throughout the year, as a result of rainwater harvesting and water recharge. Two rainwater harvesting tanks are set up in the campus. Soak pits are provided around the buildings to harvest rainwater. The ground water

recharging system ensures a steady level of water in the wells in the locality. The vegetation cover prevents erosion of topsoil, keeping the land fertile.

A training on Mushroom cultivation and marketing was conducted in the College auditorium on 24th January, 2020 in association with the Department of Zoology. The programme aimed to attract student entrepreneurs into mushroom farming. About 100 students, teachers and parents participated in the training. Smt. Leenarani, a Karshakasree awardee and one of the master trainers from the Krishi Vigjan Kendra, Alapuzha lead the training programme. The faculty, staff and students had a hands-on training session during the programme.

<u>A waste management plant was constructed in the college with the financial support from the</u> Thazhakkara Grama Panchayath to convert bio-waste into manure.

The Departments of Botany, Biotechnology and Chemistry do assessment of the quality of drinking water in the locality of Kallumala.

10.2.2.2 Modification of existing course and curriculum for festering community engagement and					

10.2.2.2 Modification of existing course and curriculum for fostering community engagement and social responsibility

The University regulations do not allow the modification of the courses offered. The possible modification done by teachers is through innovative delivery of the content in classrooms, keeping the society in mind.

The projects given to students aim at inculcating them to be socially relevant and to create a generation that fosters community values within them.

Centre for Nanosciences and Human Breast Milk Research of the Institute, in collaboration with Pushpagiri Institute of Medical Sciences, Tiruvalla, is involved in the development of India's first human milk fortifier for preterm infants. The fortifier will play a vital role in reducing the neonatal mortality which is significantly high in India due to the increasing number of preterm births. The fortifier can be used to supplement and enrich the donor's milk by meeting the necessary nutritional requirement of preterm infants. Centre for Advanced Functional Materials, conducts research in the field of material sciences and plays a major role in the development of advanced functional materials for various industrial and pharmaceutical applications including optical communication devices, solar cell applications, etc.

The institution aims to help the underprivileged and downtrodden by giving them equal opportunities. Imparting education to the marginalized is of the mission statements of the college.

The college offers a platform for activities like Unnath Bharath Abhiyan, NSS/NCC, flood relief etc., to extend support to people who are in need. Unnath Bharath Abhiyan : Bishop Moore College is a part of Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, an initiative of the Ministry of Education, inspired by the vision of transformational change in rural development processes.

NSS/NCC Activities :They try to awaken the social consciousness of the students by providing them opportunities to work with and among the people. The activities include Flash Mobs (Awareness of Road Safety, Women Security), Blood donation, Food packet distribution for the needy, Visiting of Orphanages, Old age homes, palliative care centres, Cleaning Programmes for the public in various places like the District Court, Railway Station premises and nearby water bodies.

Flood Relief Activities: The staff and students were actively involved in flood relief activities at Chengannur and Mavelikara, offering help in the evacuation of people from affected areas, locating and directing the rescue teams to the needy, giving necessary food, clothes and other items to relief camps, etc., from 9-16 August 2019.

The Student House Project - The construction of the flood resistant house for a needy student was undertaken and completed as part of the College Flood Relief Activities, in collaboration with the Grama Panchayat and the Kuwait Chapter of the Alumni Association.

10.2.2.3 Examples of new audit courses

The college is not offering any audit courses.

10.2.2.4 Research in partnership with local community

- <u>A survey was conducted in Price collection</u> in the local Kallumala Market in the year 2017 to study the movements in the prices of consumer goods and services under the auspices of the Economic Forum and the Department of Economics. The prices of groceries were collected every week on the market day and recorded, thus enabling the students to study the movement of the Consumer Price Index(CPI).
- <u>Financial Literacy Mission</u>: A study was organised to find out the level of awareness on financial literacy and competency among 50 samples each from among 42 sub groups (house wives, electricians, plumbers, bank employees, doctors, nurses, sale man, business man, teachers, etc) in the community, in the year 2019. The study revealed that except for the chartered accountants who were 100% literate, all other groups lacked significantly in financial literacy and competency.
- <u>Survey on Water and Soil Quality</u>: The members of Nature Club prepared a questionnaire for gathering information regarding the existing scenario of water and soil in Mavelikara Taluk. The survey was conducted in eight panchayaths of Mavelikara Taluk during the last week of December 2015.
- Project on 'The Problems of Women in Rural Areas': The women students were given a project to identify the problems of women belonging to the rural background. They identified the need for women to be economically independent and pointed out the need for a stable income and a job. The unit unanimously decided to complete the PSC registration process of all its members at the earliest. In order to assist the students to crack the PSC exam, the unit decided to discuss 25 model PSC questions every week. The projects also identified that

there is an urgent need to enhance the English communications skills of the women candidates. It was decided that all the unit members should try to communicate in English

10.2.4 Participation in Environmental Management/Disaster Management/Other Related Activities 10.2.4.1 - Institutional response to natural disaster / calamities over the last five years. Describe in maximum 500 words

Kerala faced devastating floods in August 2018 and areas nearby college was also affected. As part of our commitment the college actively involved in the flood relief activities of the college.

- A team of teachers headed by the Principal visited the homes of students affected by flood. It was identified that one of our students was drastically affected by tue flood that he literally lost his home. The Staff and students decided to build a food resisant home for him. The house project was completed in March 2021, through donations from students, teachers and well-wishers and the key was handed over to him and his parents by the Manager of the college and Bishop of CSI Madhya Kerala Diocese
- Twenty-seven students were identified to be severely affected by the disaster. After evaluating the extent of loss occurred to each of them, financial assistance of Rs. 5000/each provided to 2 among them, Rs. 25000/- each for five students and Rs. 5000/- each to the remaining 20 students. <u>The financial assistance was handed over by the Manager</u> of the College on the Thanksgiving Day of the College
- <u>100 bedsheets were distributed</u> to the nearest flood relief camp by staff
- <u>NSS took part in flood relief activities</u> including cleaning affected places and donations in the form of food, clothes and medicines.
- <u>Teachers and students took part in rescue operations</u> of isolated people in the flood affected areas
- A national Seminar was organized in January 2020 to discuss on the <u>Scientific Solutions to</u> <u>Sustainable Rebuilding of Kerala in the Post Flood Scenario</u>. The seminar had around 50 participants from among the local community in which Dr. M.C. - NSS Volunteers <u>distributed Medical kits at Kainakar</u>i in Kuttanad on 18/08/2018, after the floods. The volunteers became a part of a flood relief cleaning programme called 'Cleaning Pandanad', a mission organized by the Southern Railway at Pandanad region, Chengannur on 28/08/2018.
- Cleaning Pandanad Programme: A programme was conducted at the pandanad region in

chengannur. This was a cleaning programme which was organized by southern railway in accordance with flood relief. N S S volunteers actively participated in this cleaning programme.

- <u>A seminar on 'Well Water Cleaning'</u> was conducted by the NSS Unit of the college on 06/09/2018. The seminar was led by officials from Swachata Mission & Health mission. The volunteers took initiative to clean the well water of flood affected areas.

- <u>A Greenhouse</u>, for protecting and conserving plants, is maintained by the Department of Botany and Biotechnology.
- <u>MIGPC, Moore Initiative for Gene Pool Conservation</u>, was inaugurated on 18 November 2017. Various projects on biodiversity preservation were conducted by the staff and students.
- Numerous projects on water quality analysis of rivers, ponds and lakes were conducted by staff and students, in order to study the preservation of environmental resources.
- A Rainwater harvesting system is maintained in the College campus, for collecting and storing rainwater from the rooftop and the terrace. The system includes a storage tank with a capacity of 30,000 litres. The stored water is used judiciously in the College Campus itself for irrigating agriculture gardens, for use in toilets etc.
- "Mazhakkuzhi"(Recharge pit) is an in-situ method of rain water conservation and allows the rainwater to refill ground water table. There are many 'Mazhakkuzhi' constructed across the College campus to recharge ground water.
